These points were made at the International Convocation on Contrasts in Communism Saturday at Mount Hermon School by the featured speaker.

Dr. Harry Schwartz, specialist in Soviet affairs, member of the New York Times editorial board and author, addressed 300 students from 20 private schools. The students also had discussion groups and refreshments at Beveridge Hall, then moved to the Northfield School campus for another talk by Dr. Schwartz and a question period.

The guest speaker suggested that the convocation theme "Is the Communist Bloc Breaking Up?", should be changed to, "What Should The United States Do about the Break-up of the Communist Bloc?"

He said there is no doubt that the Communist world is break up-so, to some degree, is the West. He said this is because World War Ill is unthinkable, nobody expects it so everybody's returned to looking out for his own country first.


