The supreme court decided yesterday that in the payment of an inheritance tax the amount which is exempted by law shall not be subtracted from the

law shall not be subtracted from the entire bequest, but from that on which the heir pays the least tax.

According to law a 1 per cent tax is fixed on the first \$25,000, 1½ per cent on the next \$25,000 and 2 per cent on the remainder. By law also \$4,000 is exempt.
